A Letter from Our Executive Director

Hello, Friends of Little Free Library!

A global pandemic has turned the world upside down since our last newsletter. While our procedures have changed, our goals have not. Together we're working to expand the Little Free Library network in partnership with individuals, schools, and local communities.

In June, we launched a new program with the city of Albuquerque, New Mexico. City leadership wanted to increase volunteerism in the community but needed activities that could be done with social distancing. Using the city's volunteer portal, Little Free Library became one of the first national organizations to participate. Residents can sign up to install a Little Free Library book-sharing box; help support an existing one, either by supplying books or making simple repairs; or build a Little Free Library for someone else to steward. With success, this test may be a model for other cities to pursue.

School district foundations have also been key partners. As schools closed, so did library access. The solution for the Hillsborough Education Foundation in Tampa was a network of 50 Little Free Library installations—one for every elementary school in their city. Children now access books conveniently and safely whether the school is open or not.

Little Free Library hit a major milestone this year, reaching 100,000 registered Little Free Library book-sharing boxes worldwide. The 100,000th library was launched in Houston, Texas, at the Association for the Advancement of Mexican Americans (AAMA) on March 11.

"The impact that the Little Free Library will have on the students, clients, and families we serve is truly incredible," said Joe Jimenez, President and CEO of AAMA. "What better way to support literacy than through a hands-on approach that this library will provide?"

The library features the artwork of award-winning illustrator John Parra from the book *Little Libraries, Big Heroes*. Publisher Houghton Mifflin Harcourt will fill the library with free English- and Spanish-language children's books for its first year.

Impact Library Program

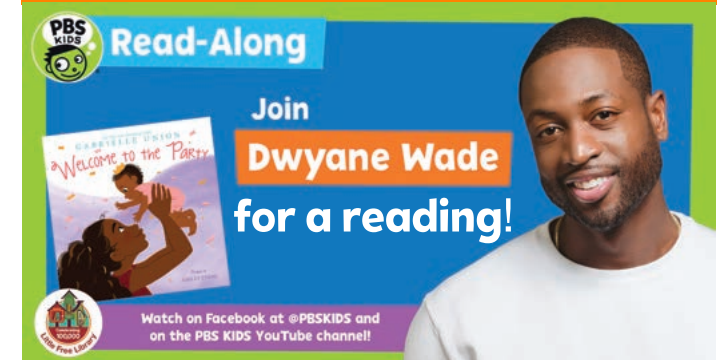
Our Impact Library Program places Little Free Libraries full of books in underserved areas. More than 1,000 little libraries have been granted to deserving recipients. A recent grantee, Heather Smurr, wanted to provide students at Ingram Elementary access to a continuously changing array of literature.

"Ingram, Texas's very first LFL is up and running and we couldn't be more excited!" Heather said. "This library will serve a rural population with a high number of low-income families. The LFL is located in the front of our elementary school where families will have easy access day after day, which is especially needed during this time of quarantine and COVID restrictions. As our town doesn't have a public library of its own, our LFL will offer a way to get books in both English and Spanish into the hands of our hard-working families."
