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## For Mental Health Awareness Month, Little Free Library and Penguin Random House Share Hundreds of Books About Emotional Well-Being

The publisher is also sponsoring 20 Little Free Libraries for underserved communities to promote mental health



Saint Paul, MN (May 23, 2023) – Today Little Free Library (LFL) and Penguin Random House (PRH) announced their activities honoring Mental Health Awareness Month. Through the partnership, PRH will sponsor 20 Little Free Library book-sharing boxes granted to high-need communities via LFL's Impact Library Program, provide more than 500 mental health–focused books for those libraries and offer an additional 2,000 books for a national giveaway.

"It is an honor to be working with Penguin Random House to share resources to inform and educate about a variety of mental health issues as part of May's Mental Health Awareness Month," said LFL Executive Director Greig Metzger. "With Penguin Random House's grant funding and book donations,
